The college has regular practice of schematising activities for both advanced and slow learners. The feedback of teachers, mentoring

classes as well as the Parents Teachers Meet turn out to be the major criteria to help both the types of learners in their own respect. As far as the question of advanced learners are concerned the college has initiated internal Academic Excellence award for the best graduate and the highest mark owners of every subject leading to generate a sense of competition among them. The prizes mostly financed by the faculty of the college are listed in the Prospectus cum Academic Calendar of the college every year. In case of slow learners, arranging special classes has been the regular practice of the college as the students make up various acquisition levels. The medium of instruction too creates trouble in the teaching learning process. Besides the tutorial classes, teachers take the opportunity of the results of internal assessment mentoring classes to identify the slow learners. Those having problems in communication are motivated for oral presentation on their syllabus related topics.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The student centric activities mainly adopted in the teaching learning process are listed below

Seminar/ class paper presentation

The seminars are good platforms for all types of learners to work in groups and to present their views verbally which enhances their communication skill. The topics for the departmental seminars are specified in the prospectus and accordingly, topics are distributed

to prepare the seminar papers.

Peer Teaching

Peer teaching is a regular activity practised by a few departments of the college. A few nearby schools are selected where the undergraduate students teach the students of class IX and X. For the purpose, students are trained for specific unit of syllabus from school curriculum.

Project Work

Project works being the part of some degree programmes help the learners to extend their knowledge to apply in newer and newer fields.

Field Visit

Regarding the field visit for the students, they get engaged in a process of learning by doing and they are also to prepare a report on their visit. Some departments conduct field visit to different universities and historically important sites.

Students are engaged both physically and psychologically through peer learning and peer teaching project. Every department possesses departmental library.

The post covid education scenario necessitates the use of ICT tools that were used by the teachers to continue teaching in both online and offline mode. The following are a few adoption in respect of ICT tools in the teaching learning process:

- There is a computer lab with a capacity of 31 PCs where students attend classes for IT, Retail, they also prepare

their presentations with the help of the respective teachers

- The students of the department of Geography use the technology of GPS and GIS for teaching remote sensing.
- The department of English arranges for movies based on the texts of the curriculum for honours and PG classes. For that purpose, the smart classrooms are used. Question answer sessions are held after the presentation.
- Most of the teachers use internet sources to provide material for their classes.
- The dept of Retail and IT regularly utilize the projector for the students' presentation.
- The department of Theatre and Stagecraft screened movies for students in the projector installed in their respective classroom.
- The interactive board installed in a mini conference room is used for video conferencing, online lectures for both students and faculty

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The transparency of the internal assessment procedure is assured through the following steps taken towards conducting sessional examination as well as assignments, seminar presentation, project preparation designed by the designated body of the college. The PG departments devise their own mechanism for internal assessment. Here follows a set of instance for the same.

- Students are briefed about the internal assessment system in their Orientation programmes conducted at the beginning of each session.
- Two types of internal assessment are conducted throughout one academic session viz sessional examinations and assignment. There is a centralized sessional examination system the tentative timing of which is displayed in the Academic calendar itself before the commencement of the classes.
- The internal examination committee that is displayed in the academic calendar prepares the schedule date wise along with the invigilation duty list for the faculty. The invigilation duty list is also posted in the official whats app group of the teachers.
- Only teaching staff is deputed with invigilation duty.
- All the other records of examinations are maintained both by the examination committees and the departments.
- The questions for the assignment are discussed in the class and the students are given stipulated time to submit it.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The following mechanism is adopted to deal with the examination related grievances:

- A committee to conduct the internal examination is formed before the beginning of every academic session the mention of is found in the Academic calendar.
- In case of the absence of students in any examination with valid and authenticated reasons through applications, re sessional examinations are arranged with a set of new question papers.

- The college provides all kinds of assistance to the students willing to apply for Re checking of answer scripts of External examination of Gauhati University.
- The computing of marks in the university portal is implemented maintained by the Vice Principal along with the Head of the department of concerned subject. The internal assessment mark is recorded systematically by every department so that the students' grievance can be addressed justly.
- The parents are given an opportunity to voice out their concern over the assessment of answer scripts of their wards in the Parent Teacher Meet held in each semester.
- The checked answer scripts are shown to the students. Their signature is taken at the back of the copies. In case of any grievance on their part students can directly talk to the concerned teacher.

Besides the regular activity of conducting feedback system, the institution arranges academic audit by resourceful academician. Performance of all the departments and every individual teacher is assessed accordingly. An exit meeting is held to intimate the staff about any shortcoming or gap on their part and thereby suggestions are given for the improvisation of the same. Regarding the due promotion of the teachers, API score is calculated according to the prescribed format. Professional contribution to the academic is also assessed through the publication of research papers in scopus indexed journals as well as books. The teachers' engagement in FDP, short term courses, performing invigilation duties, contribution to college administration committees, engagement in Governing Body, NAAC, UBA, NIRF, NSS, NCC etc. Regarding the appraisal of non-teaching staff, regular meetings are held to assess their attendance details. For the effective and efficient mobilisation of funds, The master key for taking financial decision and related matter are Finance Committee and the Purchase and the Governing Body who constantly monitor and encourage for the proper utilization of allocated funds as per need. Best Practice

Best Practice-1

- Title of the Practice: Fostering Gram Swaraj: Commitment beyond campus
- The Context:

Sonapur College, since its inception focuses on building a strong linkage with the people of the neighbouring villages, that mostly belong to tribal communities. This specific approach can be explicitly attributed to the fact that the college is founded exclusively with the funds raised by the public. Therefore, the college deemed it a moral obligation to address the societal needs and contribute to redress the problems faced by the people of the neighbouring villages.

- Objectives of the Practice:

Accomplishment of societal commitment through initiatives of social and economic well being of the rural people by integrating knowledge into practice is one of the primary motives of the college. Instilling a strong sense of ethical and humanitarian values among the students, besides developing leadership quality is another fundamental objective behind the mission of 'Village Adoption' and other extension activities in the neighbouring areas.

- The Practice:

Extension activities are a strong forte of the Sonapur College which exhibits an enduring commitment to the society as well as the nation. The various programmes initiated by the Extension Cell, NSS,

NCC, Dr. Dhanjit Medhi Foundation, a registered Trust founded under the ambit of Sonapur College in memory of its late Former Principal, the College Union Society and different departments go beyond curriculum to foster social empowerment, livelihood security and improvement of the socio-economic standard of the people of the neighbourhood. The various initiatives and practices are as follows-

- Life and Livelihood Initiatives at Dikchak
 - 'Destination Dikchak' - a familiarisation tour for the stakeholders of the tourism industry - both private and government - including the tour operators and representatives of the Assam Tourism Development Corporation was organised on 24.01.2021. It comprised of a trekking, lunch cooked by the local communities and cultural evening in Dikchak. It was organised with the purpose of giving the community an idea regarding the income opportunities from tourism.
 - As a follow up to Destination Dikchak and to initiate tourism activities in the village for augmenting livelihood opportunities of the communities, another programme 'Dikchak Village Walk and Discussion on Tourism Development in Dikchak' on 20.02.2021 was organised where tour operators and tourist guides along with community members of Dikchak were involved. Based on their insights on tourism potentiality in and around the village of Dikchak, they provided feedbacks and their valuable suggestions on how to promote and start tourism activities in the region.
 - Training programme for the women of Dikchak village on 'Application of Natural Dyes in Eri and Cotton Yarn' from 8th March 2021 - 10th March 2021.
- Educational
 - Teaching in feeder schools.
 - Peer teaching by students - Department of Economics at Gyanjyoti High School (1.02.2021), Department of Political Science at Gyanjyoti High School (2 - 3.02.2021).
 - Special coaching programme for CSIR UGC NET by Dept. of Geography.
 - Extension Education Programme
 - Workshop for high school teachers on Language Skills.
- Health and sensitization
 - Awareness on COVID and distribution of sanitizers and masks in nearby villages.

 - Cleanliness Drive at Sonapur Public Crematorium and five primary schools by NSS Unit.

- Moral and Intellectual Development
 - Inter School Quiz Competition by 'Dr. Dhanjit Medhi Foundation'.
 - Financial support to noted Litterateur Sri Murulidhar Das by Dr. Dhanjit Medhi Foundation
 - Webinar on 'Fostering UBA - A Commitment of HEIs Beyond Campus, Issues and Challenges.' On 7.8.2021.
- Obstacles faced if any /strategies adopted to overcome them

The frequently encountered problems faced during the augmentation of the mission of skilling are -

- Lack of scientific spirit owing to poor literacy level of the villagers.
- Lack of motivation of the people especially towards entrepreneurial mindset.
- Limited financial resources of the college.
- Apathy in the part of government agencies.
- The consultation with village communities needs to be a continuous process which becomes sometimes comes to a standstill.
- The onset of the pandemic and the restrictions to be followed has also emerged as one of the hurdles in giving a thrust to the mission.

Strategies to overcome the hurdles

- Efforts have been made in the form of awareness, guidance and support programmes for young generations to infuse them with the scientific spirit.
- Initiation towards registering the college under 'Unnat Bharat

Abhiyan' under MHRD.

- Extension activities are accorded priority under the curriculum so that the contacts with communities and surrounding areas can be kept intact.
- Impact of the Practice
 - The appreciation and the expression of gratitude from the managements of the beneficiary schools.
 - At the time of adoption there was only one matriculate in Dikchak in 2003, but today, we have a large number of matriculates, intermediates, graduates and post-graduates there.
 - There are four Self Help Groups (SHGs) formed in the village after its adoption working for financial self-sufficiency. Having registered themselves as SHGs, the women of Dikchak village have been able to undergo various trainings organised by various agencies and institutions from time to time as informed by them. This has enabled a level of economic empowerment of the women in the village.
 - A tourism related organisation named Ampri Valley Eco-Tourism Development Society was formed with the youths of Dikchak village and neighbouring village so that tourism activities can be undertaken after consultation with the tour operators. Since the formation of the society, some trekking trips have been successfully conducted. Teachers of Sonapur College also form the advisory board of the committee and the Department of TTM (B.Voc) is closely associated with the society in matters of tourism consultation.
 - The impact of cleanliness drives, awareness programmes etc are quite visible from their roads and households where the bamboo dustbins are extensively used.
 - The purifier cum reservoir constructed for the spring water tapping in the adopted village is now providing continuous flow of water for drinking and other uses.
- Resources Required

Both financial resources and technically sound human resource is required for augmenting the extension and outreach programme in the neighbouring villages. The fund currently available for such initiatives is not sufficient. It is expected that through approval of schemes under UBA, the college would be able to deliver service to the community at large. Further, the college is also contemplating on ways of materializing CSR funds from industries and companies for the purpose.

BEST PRACTICE-2

- Title of the Practice: Skilling the New Generation (Skilling for Resilience)
- CONTEXT

In an era of globalisation, digitalisation and in the face of an ever-increasing army of educated unemployed, building a career without possessing specific skills, be it technical, soft or life skills seems to have become next to impossible. In the present context, skill development, has therefore, become an important pillar of growth in the significant transition of a generation. Today, a competency enhancement approach turns out to be the need of the hour to create 'resilient' human resource which is adaptable to the changing scenario of global employment trends.

- OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE

A zealous commitment to its cherished mission, worrying scenario of mass unemployment in spite of prevalence of myriads of explored and unexplored areas of job opportunities, has prompted Sonapur College to take up various skill enhancement initiatives for the students. Sonapur College sincerely believes that the confidence and competency building of the students while introducing them to job opportunities and challenging responsibilities in the upcoming sectors are the key towards building a strong human resource.

- THE PRACTICE

Sonapur College has maintained a long run practice of developing skills among the students within and beyond the framework of course curriculum. Besides offering three UGC funded B.Voc Courses in Retail Management & IT, Tourism & Travel Management and Theatre and Stagecraft, the college is also currently offering Certificate Courses on Yoga, Spoken English and Computer Basics.

Moreover, there are a number of practices in the college which essentially provide the much-required boost to its skill enhancements initiatives. The salient features of such practices are

-

- Speaking and writing skill enhancement training to identify and improve the public speaking ability of students.
- Beauty and Wellness Course is introduced to develop skills for self-application as well as to build their career.

- Incubation Centre set up at Sonapur College under Assam StartUp the Nest, Department of Industry and Commerce, Govt of Assam and Innovation Park, IIM Kolkata has successfully incubated the start up 'Seva Maitra' which received a grant of Rs 5 lakhs. Another start up incubated at Sonapur College, Emozi was successfully launched by Hon'ble Minister of Industries and Commerce on 14.02.2021.
- Ideathon 2021, an initiative of Assam of Assam Start up, organised by the Incubation Centre of Sonapur College was inaugurated in Sonapur College. Under this initiative, an idea incubated at Sonapur College also found place in the list of winners. Many participants participated in the programme and placed their ideas.
- Sona Harvest, a specially designed sales outlet where the students can make, display and sell their hand made artefacts, mostly traditional handicrafts and household agro-products. Many students have sold their home produces through the outlet and have earned since the launch of SonaHarvest. It also serves as a channel through which they can build their business and entrepreneurial skills. It also gives them an opportunity to showcase their skills and receive an impetus to make their talent market-friendly.
- Peer Teaching by the UG and PG students helps them in building their skills and confidence.
- Managerial Skill and Leadership quality development of the students through the opportunities to manage different events of the college right from venue arrangements to catering etc.
- On job trainings: The OJT's in different companies/ business houses by the students of B. Vocational Courses enables them to enhance competencies for different jobs and entrepreneurial ventures.
- Skill of traditional handicrafts: through the workshops, competitions etc
- Theatrical Skill by holding regular workshops and production of plays, besides assignments from the authority to make and edit college videos for different.
- During the pandemic, skill-oriented webinars were organised - 'Entrepreneurship Skill Development', a webinar on travel photography 'Tourism through Frames', 'Computational Linguistics and the Assamese Language.'
- Life Skill Workshops building through motivational workshops that focus on self-focus, communication, critical thinking, engaged learning, facing adversity etc.
- Obstacles faced if any, strategies adopted to overcome them

The major obstacles faced during the augmentation of the mission are:

- Insufficient fund and non-availability of qualified faculty to start new skill- based Certificate/Diploma courses.
 - Lack of awareness amongst the students regarding skill courses and reluctance.
 - Lack of motivation of the students towards the importance of skilling
 - Presumptive mindset of the students with typical inclination towards salaried services, especially Government Services.
 - Reluctance in the part of the reputed corporates to absorb the graduates of these courses.
 - No funding for short term certificate courses and B. Voc Courses from the Government and private sponsors.
- Impact of the Practice:

Various positive implications can be attributed to the skilling initiatives of the college over the year. For example, the initiatives for the enhancement of oratory skill and leadership quality have produced debaters and brilliant student leaders like the General Secretary of Gauhati University Students Union. The students of the college have received special complements from the DSW, Gauhati University for their outstanding managerial skills displayed in the Zonal Youth Festival hosted by the college. Similarly, many of the alumnus seem to have managed to carve echelon in the world of fashion, film and television world as actors, make-up artistes, craftsmen etc. The bamboo made artifacts of the students, especially dustbins have received wide acclamation.

- Resources Required: In order to augment the mission of 'Skilling the New Generations', the college needs both financial and human resources. Financial resource is needed primarily to initiate new skill development programme in the college. New short-term training programme for craftsmen like plumber, electrician, mobile repairing would be quite instrumental to fulfill their demand in Guwahati, the capital city of Assam.

Institutional Distinctive Practice:

- Understanding and Institutionalizing Heritage Conservation"

Mission of the College:

Sonapur College was established with a mission to impart higher education among the students of the locality along with creating an environment for the intellectual, ethical, moral and physical upliftment of the people mostly belonging to tribal communities. As the word 'heritage' in the present times encompasses both natural and cultural heritages, the college has gradually assigned

importance to spreading awareness amongst the communities and students for preserving both natural and cultural heritages of the area. This includes preserving of cultural heritage by preserving cultural artefacts and generating awareness about the importance of natural landmarks found in the region.

Context and the Practice:

Sonapur College is situated in an area inhabited by culturally diverse people of different ethnic groups giving it a unique identity which is gradually diminishing. Therefore, it has become a top priority to safeguard their rich culture inherited through generations. Keeping in view of the this necessity, the Sonapur College has incorporated the "Heritage Conservation" in its mission since inception. The conservation of different artifacts' as remnants of heritage in a 'Heritage Museum' in the college premises is only the baseline of the multifaceted activities undertaken by the college. Apart from the same, an awareness regarding the importance natural landmarks around the region like rivers, streams, beels that are ecologically important is sought to be generated for environmental consciousness.

Initiatives during 2020-21:

The different initiatives undertaken by the college to augment the mission "Understanding and Institutionalizing Heritage Conservation" during the session 2020-21 are summarized as follows-

- More artifacts' have been added to the museum, mostly collected by the students.
- The students were guided to take up various places and spots in and around Sonapur and greater Dimoria area that have ecological significance and are associated with the culture of the inhabitants of the region like Bomani Beel where community fishing occurs in the month of January. The students of 3rd semester were asked to make reports on such significant areas that included the importance of the area, its cultural association to the inhabitants and its prospects of tourism for safeguarding the area. Likewise, various destinations have been selected by the students to prepare their research reports.
- In all occasions of the college, the invited guests are felicitated with the local traditional artifacts viz 'Gamocha', 'Arnai', 'fali', 'sarai' belonging to the different neighbouring communities.

- The practice of making traditional properties such as masks, puppets etc needed for the performances in stage or movie is being carried out by the students of 'Theatre and Stage Craft'.
- A dekachang (a traditional meeting place for the males of the Tiwa tribe) has been built which serves the purpose of a boys common room in the college.

- There is a computer lab with a capacity of 31 PCs where students attend classes for IT, Retail, they also prepare their presentations with the help of the respective teachers
- The students of the department of Geography use the technology of GPS and GIS for teaching remote sensing.
- The department of English arranges for movies based on the texts of the curriculum for honours and PG classes. For that purpose, the smart classrooms are used. Question answer sessions are held after the presentation.
- Most of the teachers use internet sources to provide material for their classes.

The transparency of the internal assessment procedure is assured through the following steps taken towards conducting sessional examination as well as assignments, seminar presentation, project preparation designed by the designated body of the college. The PG departments devise their own mechanism for internal assessment. Here follows a set of instance for the same.

- Students are briefed about the internal assessment system in their Orientation programmes conducted at the beginning of each session.
- Two types of internal assessment are conducted throughout one academic session viz sessional examinations and assignment. There is a centralized sessional examination system the tentative timing of which is displayed in the Academic calendar itself before the commencement of the classes.
- The internal examination committee that is displayed in the academic calendar prepares the schedule date wise along with the invigilation duty list for the faculty. The invigilation duty list is also posted in the official whats app group of the teachers.
- Only teaching staff is deputed with invigilation duty.
- All the other records of examinations are maintained both by the examination committees and the departments.
- The questions for the assignment are discussed in the class and the students are given stipulated time to submit it.

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college pushes hard for adequate availability of physical infrastructure to accommodate the increasing enrollment and introduction of Post Graduate courses in a number of departments viz., Geography, Assamese and English. The Academic Calendar Committee plans ahead for all requirements regarding classrooms, laboratories, furniture and other equipments for the smooth running of the academic environment. The college is equipped with a state-of-the-art computer laboratory funded by Guwahati Refinery. The department of Geography is provided with a GIS enabled computer laboratory. The fund was given to construct the ramp up to the second floor but the college authority has completed it up to the top floor i.e., the third floor.

Besides the regular activity of conducting feedback system, the institution arranges academic audit by resourceful academician. Performance of all the departments and every individual teacher is assessed accordingly. An exit meeting is held to intimate the staff about any shortcoming or gap on their part and thereby suggestions are given for the improvisation of the same. Regarding the due promotion of the teachers, API score is calculated according to the prescribed format. Professional contribution to the academic is also assessed through the publication of research papers in scopus indexed journals as well as books. The teachers' engagement in FDP, short term courses, performing invigilation duties, contribution to college administration committees, engagement in Governing Body, NAAC, UBA, NIRF, NSS, NCC etc. Regarding the appraisal of non-teaching staff, regular meetings are held to assess their attendance details. Best Practice

Best Practice-1

- Title of the Practice: Fostering Gram Swaraj: Commitment beyond campus
- The Context:

Sonapur College, since its inception focuses on building a strong linkage with the people of the neighbouring villages, that mostly belong to tribal communities. This specific approach can be explicitly attributed to the fact that the college is founded exclusively with the funds raised by the public. Therefore, the college deemed it a moral obligation to address the societal needs and contribute to redress the problems faced by the people of the neighbouring villages.

- Objectives of the Practice:

Accomplishment of societal commitment through initiatives of social and economic well being of the rural people by integrating knowledge into practice is one of the primary motives of the college. Instilling a strong sense of ethical and humanitarian values among the students, besides developing leadership quality is another fundamental objective behind the mission of 'Village Adoption' and other extension activities in the neighbouring areas.

- The Practice:

Extension activities are a strong forte of the Sonapur College which exhibits an enduring commitment to the society as well as the nation. The various programmes initiated by the Extension Cell, NSS, NCC, Dr. Dhanjit Medhi Foundation, a registered Trust founded under the ambit of Sonapur College in memory of its late Former Principal, the College Union Society and different departments go beyond curriculum to foster social empowerment, livelihood security and improvement of the socio-economic standard of the people of the neighbourhood. The various initiatives and practices are as follows-

- Life and Livelihood Initiatives at Dikchak
 - 'Destination Dikchak' - a familiarisation tour for the stakeholders of the tourism industry - both private and government - including the tour operators and representatives of the Assam Tourism Development Corporation was organised on 24.01.2021. It comprised of a trekking, lunch cooked by the local communities and cultural evening in Dikchak. It was organised with the purpose of giving the community an idea regarding the income opportunities from tourism.
 - As a follow up to Destination Dikchak and to initiate tourism activities in the village for augmenting livelihood opportunities of the communities, another programme 'Dikchak Village Walk and Discussion on Tourism Development in Dikchak' on 20.02.2021 was organised where tour operators and tourist guides along with community members of Dikchak were involved. Based on their insights on tourism potentiality in and around the village of Dikchak, they provided feedbacks and their valuable suggestions on how to promote and start tourism activities in the region.

'Application of Natural Dyes in Eri and Cotton Yarn' from 8th March 2021 - 10th March 2021.

 - Webinar on 'Fostering UBA - A Commitment of HEIs Beyond Campus, Issues and Challenges.' On 7.8.2021.
- Obstacles faced if any /strategies adopted to overcome them

The frequently encountered problems faced during the augmentation of the mission of skilling are -

- Lack of scientific spirit owing to poor literacy level of

the villagers.

- Lack of motivation of the people especially towards entrepreneurial mindset.
- Limited financial resources of the college.
- Apathy in the part of government agencies.
- The consultation with village communities needs to be a continuous process which sometimes comes to a standstill.
- The onset of the pandemic and the restrictions to be followed has also emerged as one of the hurdles in giving a thrust to the mission.

Strategies to overcome the hurdles

- Efforts have been made in the form of awareness, guidance and support programmes for young generations to infuse them with the scientific spirit.
- Initiation towards registering the college under 'Unnat Bharat Abhiyan' under MHRD.
- Extension activities are accorded priority under the curriculum so that the contacts with communities and surrounding areas can be kept intact.
- Impact of the Practice
 - The appreciation and the expression of gratitude from the managements of the beneficiary schools.
 - At the time of adoption there was only one matriculate in Dikchak in 2003, but today, we have a large number of matriculates, intermediates, graduates and post-graduates there.
 - There are four Self Help Groups (SHGs) formed in the village after its adoption working for financial self-sufficiency. Having registered themselves as SHGs, the women of Dikchak village have been able to undergo various trainings organised by various agencies and institutions from time to time as informed by them. This has enabled a level of economic empowerment of the women in the village.
 - A tourism related organisation named Ampri Valley Eco-Tourism Development Society was formed with the youths of Dikchak village and neighbouring village so that tourism activities can be undertaken after consultation with the tour operators. Since the formation of the society, some trekking trips have been successfully conducted. Teachers of Sonapur College also form the advisory board of the committee and the Department of TTM (B.Voc) is closely

associated with the society in matters of tourism consultation.

- The impact of cleanliness drives, awareness programmes etc are quite visible from their roads and households where the bamboo dustbins are extensively used.
- The purifier cum reservoir constructed for the spring water tapping in the adopted village is now providing continuous flow of water for drinking and other uses.

- Resources Required

Both financial resources and technically sound human resource is required for augmenting the extension and outreach programme in the neighbouring villages. The fund currently available for such initiatives is not sufficient. It is expected that through approval of schemes under UBA, the college would be able to deliver service to the community at large. Further, the college is also contemplating on ways of materializing CSR funds from industries and companies for the purpose.

BEST PRACTICE-2

- Title of the Practice: Skilling the New Generation (Skilling for Resilience)
- CONTEXT

In an era of globalisation, digitalisation and in the face of an ever-increasing army of educated unemployed, building a career without possessing specific skills, be it technical, soft or life skills seems to have become next to impossible. In the present context, skill development, has therefore, become an important pillar of growth in the significant transition of a generation. Today, a competency enhancement approach turns out to be the need of the hour to create 'resilient' human resource which is adaptable to the changing scenario of global employment trends.

- OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE

A zealous commitment to its cherished mission, worrying scenario of mass unemployment inspite of prevalence of myriads of explored and unexplored areas of job opportunities, has prompted Sonapur College to take up various skill enhancement initiatives for the students. Sonapur College sincerely believes that the confidence and competency building of the students while introducing them to job opportunities and challenging responsibilities in the upcoming sectors are the key towards building a strong human

resource.

- THE PRACTICE

Sonapur College has maintained a long run practice of developing skills among the students within and beyond the framework of course curriculum. Besides offering three UGC funded B.Voc Courses in Retail Management & IT, Tourism & Travel Management and Theatre and Stagecraft, the college is also currently offering Certificate Courses on Yoga, Spoken English and Computer Basics.

Moreover, there are a number of practices in the college which essentially provide the much-required boost to its skill enhancements initiatives. The salient features of such practices are -

- Speaking and writing skill enhancement training to identify and improve the public speaking ability of students.
- Beauty and Wellness Course is introduced to develop skills for self-application as well as to build their career.
- Incubation Centre set up at Sonapur College under Assam StartUp the Nest, Department of Industry and Commerce, Govt of Assam and Innovation Park, IIM Kolkata has successfully incubated the start up 'Seva Maitra' which received a grant of Rs 5 lakhs. Another start up incubated at Sonapur College, Emozi was successfully launched by Hon'ble Minister of Industries and Commerce on 14.02.2021.
- Ideathon 2021, an initiative of Assam of Assam Start up, organised by the Incubation Centre of Sonapur College was inaugurated in Sonapur College. Under this initiative, an idea incubated at Sonapur College also found place in the list of winners. Many participants participated in the programme and placed their ideas.
- Sona Harvest, a specially designed sales outlet where the students can make, display and sell their hand made artefacts, mostly traditional handicrafts and household agro-products. Many students have sold their home produces through the outlet and have earned since the launch of SonaHarvest. It also serves as a channel through which they can build their business and entrepreneurial skills. It also gives them an opportunity to showcase their skills and receive an impetus to make their talent market-friendly.
- Peer Teaching by the UG and PG students helps them in building their skills and confidence.

- Managerial Skill and Leadership quality development of the students through the opportunities to manage different events of the college right from venue arrangements to catering etc.
- On job trainings: The OJT's in different companies/ business houses by the students of B. Vocational Courses enables them to enhance competencies for different jobs and entrepreneurial ventures.
- Skill of traditional handicrafts: through the workshops, competitions etc
- Theatrical Skill by holding regular workshops and production of plays, besides assignments from the authority to make and edit college videos for different.
- During the pandemic, skill-oriented webinars were organised - 'Entrepreneurship Skill Development', a webinar on travel photography 'Tourism through Frames', 'Computational Linguistics and the Assamese Language.'
- Life Skill Workshops building through motivational workshops that focus on self-focus, communication, critical thinking, engaged learning, facing adversity etc.
- Obstacles faced if any, strategies adopted to overcome them

The major obstacles faced during the augmentation of the mission are:

- Insufficient fund and non-availability of qualified faculty to start new skill- based Certificate/Diploma courses.
- Lack of awareness amongst the students regarding skill courses and reluctance.
- Lack of motivation of the students towards the importance of skilling
- Presumptive mindset of the students with typical inclination towards salaried services, especially Government Services.
- Reluctance in the part of the reputed corporates to absorb the graduates of these courses.
- No funding for short term certificate courses and B. Voc Courses from the Government and private sponsors.
- Impact of the Practice:

Various positive implications can be attributed to the skilling initiatives of the college over the year. For example, the initiatives for the enhancement of oratory skill and leadership quality have produced debaters and brilliant student leaders like

the General Secretary of Gauhati University Students Union. The students of the college have received special complements from the DSW, Gauhati University for their outstanding managerial skills displayed in the Zonal Youth Festival hosted by the college. Similarly, many of the alumnus seem to have managed to carve echelon in the world of fashion, film and television world as actors, make-up artistes, craftsmen etc. The bamboo made artifacts of the students, especially dustbins have received wide acclamation.

- Resources Required: In order to augment the mission of 'Skilling the New Generations', the college needs both financial and human resources. Financial resource is needed primarily to initiate new skill development programme in the college. New short-term training programme for craftsmen like plumber, electrician, mobile repairing would be quite instrumental to fulfill their demand in Guwahati, the capital city of Assam.

Institutional Distinctive Practice:

- Understanding and Institutionalizing Heritage Conservation"

Mission of the College:

Sonapur College was established with a mission to impart higher education among the students of the locality along with creating an environment for the intellectual, ethical, moral and physical upliftment of the people mostly belonging to tribal communities. As the word 'heritage' in the present times encompasses both natural and cultural heritages, the college has gradually assigned importance to spreading awareness amongst the communities and students for preserving both natural and cultural heritages of the area. This includes preserving of cultural heritage by preserving cultural artefacts and generating awareness about the importance of natural landmarks found in the region.

Context and the Practice:

Sonapur College is situated in an area inhabited by culturally diverse people of different ethnic groups giving it a unique identity which is gradually diminishing. Therefore, it has become a top priority to safeguard their rich culture inherited through generations. Keeping in view of the this necessity, the Sonapur College has incorporated the "Heritage Conservation" in its mission since inception. The conservation of different artifacts' as remnants of heritage in a 'Heritage Museum' in the college premises is only the baseline of the multifaceted activities undertaken by the college. Apart from the same, an awareness regarding the importance natural landmarks around the region like

rivers, streams, beels that are ecologically important is sought to be generated for environmental consciousness.

Initiatives during 2020-21:

The different initiatives undertaken by the college to augment the mission "Understanding and Institutionalizing Heritage Conservation" during the session 2020-21 are summarized as follows-

- More artifacts' have been added to the museum, mostly collected by the students.
- The students were guided to take up various places and spots in and around Sonapur and greater Dimoria area that have ecological significance and are associated with the culture of the inhabitants of the region like Bomani Beel where community fishing occurs in the month of January. The students of 3rd semester were asked to make reports on such significant areas that included the importance of the area, its cultural association to the inhabitants and its prospects of tourism for safeguarding the area. Likewise, various destinations have been selected by the students to prepare their research reports.
- In all occasions of the college, the invited guests are felicitated with the local traditional artifacts viz 'Gamocha', 'Arnai', 'fali', 'sarai' belonging to the different neighbouring communities.
- The practice of making traditional properties such as masks, puppets etc needed for the performances in stage or movie is being carried out by the students of 'Theatre and Stage Craft'.
- A dekachang (a traditional meeting place for the males of the Tiwa tribe) has been built which serves the purpose of a boys common room in the college.
